Indonesian Legal Development Follows age growth

Legal Opinion

The law evolves with the changing times and human needs. One of the elements that led to the change and development of law is the existence of science, the discoveries in the field of technology, and the changing times as a result of the needs of society. In the life of society required law, to regulate the life of society in order to create a social life. In the country of Indonesia we can exemplify the development of law in line with the development of the legal Adeline of narcotics. In addition to narcotics used for research, narcotics are also very useful and necessary for treatment and health services, but if misused or used is not in accordance with the standard of treatment, especially if accompanied by illicit narcotics will result in a very detrimental to individuals and society, especially the younger generation, can even pose a greater danger to the life and cultural values of the nation that will ultimately be able to undermine national resilience.

The increase, control and supervision as an effort in preventing and combating the abuse and illicit trafficking of narcotics is necessary because narcotics crime is generally not done by individuals on a stand-alone basis, but done jointly even done by organised and secret syndicates

In addition, narcotics crimes are transnational by using modus operandi and advanced technology, including securing the results of narcotics crimes. While the development of the quality of crime narcotics

it has become a very serious threat to human life. Thus, Law no. 22 of 1997 on narcotics is expected to be more effective in preventing and combating the abuse and illicit trafficking of narcotics in the territory of the republic of Indonesia.

Therefore, Law no. 9 of 1976 on Narcotics was later changed to Law no. 22 of 1997 on Narcotics, which has a wider scope in terms of norms, scope of material, and the aggravated criminal penalty. The broader scope, in addition to the factors above, is also due to the development of needs and the fact that the values and norms in the prevailing provisions are no longer adequate as an effective means to prevent and combat the abuse and illicit trafficking of narcotics. Some new materials include arrangements on narcotics classification, narcotics procurement, labels and publications, community participation, narcotics destruction before court decisions acquire permanent legal

force, extension of arrest periods, phone tapping, supervised submission investigation techniques and covert purchases and consent evil to commit a narcotic crime is very modern.

In order to give psychological effect to the society not to commit the narcotic crime, it is necessary to stipulate the more severe, minimum and maximum criminal threat, since the level of danger caused by the abuse and distribution of narcotics is very threatening national security security.

To better ensure the effective implementation of control and supervision and prevention and eradication of drug abuse and illicit trafficking, it is necessary to establish a national level coordinating agency in the field of narcotics with due regard to the provisions of prevailing laws and regulations. To further make effective the prevention and eradication misuse and illicit trafficking of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor, regulated on strengthening existing institutions of the National Narcotics Agency (BNN). BNN is based on Presidential Regulation No. 83 of 2007 on National Narcotics Agency, Provincial Narcotics Board, and District / Municipal Narcotics Board. The BNN is a non-structural institution located under and directly responsible to the President, who only has the duty and function of coordinating. In Law no. 35 of 2009 on Narcotics, the role of BNN was upgraded to a non-ministerial government institution (LPNK) and strengthened its authority to conduct investigations and investigations. BNN is domiciled under the President and is accountable to the President. In addition, BNN also has representatives in the provinces and districts / municipalities as vertical agencies, namely BNN provincial and BNN districts / cities. In order to further strengthen the institution, it is also regulated regarding all property or property which is the result of the criminal acts of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor and money laundering crime from Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor based on court decision which has obtained permanent legal force seized

for the state and used for the purposes of the implementation of the prevention and eradication of the illicit misuse of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor and the efforts of medical and social rehabilitation.

To prevent and combat the misuse and illicit traffic of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor whose modus operandi is increasingly sophisticated, in Law no. 35 Year 2009 on Narcotics is also regulated on the extension of wiretapping techniques, under cover buy techniques, and controlled delivery techniques, as well as other investigative techniques to track and uncover the abuse and illicit traffic of Narcotics and Precursors Narcotics.

In order to prevent and combat the illegal misuse and trafficking of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor conducted in an organised manner and has a wide network beyond state boundaries, in Law no. 35 of 2009 on Narcotics is regulated on cooperation, whether bilateral, regional, or international.

And in Law no. 35 of 2009 on Narcotics is also regulated the role of the public in efforts to prevent and eradicate the misuse of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor including giving awards for community members who are instrumental in the prevention and eradication of abuse of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor. The award is given to law enforcers and the community who have been instrumental in preventing and eradicating the abuse and illicit traffic of Narcotics and Narcotics Precursor. As this is one example of how the law changes follow with the changing of the times that exist and what happens in the course of the law.

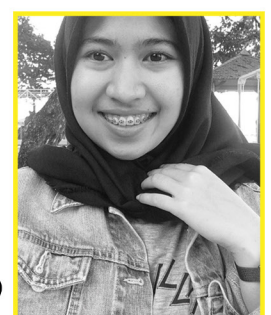

The Future of E- Commerce Regulation In Indonesia

On April 21, 2008 The Government has ratified Law no. 11 of 2008 on Information and Electronic Transactions (UU ITE). One set forth in the ITE Law is concerning trading with electronic systems, as provided for in Article 9 of the ITE Law stating that business actors offering products through electronic systems must provide complete and correct information relating to the terms of the contract, the manufacturer and the products offered. Of course the aim of the government is to provide protection for the protection of perpetrators of trade through electronic systems (e-commerce).

With the rapid development of trade through electronic transaction system, then the government then re-regulate about e-commerce in Law no. 7 of 2014 on Trade. In Article 65 paragraph (1) states that every business actor who trades goods and / or services using electronic systems shall provide data and / or information completely and correctly. Whereas Article 66 states that further provisions concerning trade transactions through electronic systems shall be regulated by or under a Government Regulation. Government efforts to develop e-commerce business by publishing the 14th economic policy package, was not fully welcomed positively by the business people.

The reason, after the publication of the policy package, e-commerce business will be regulated by various regulations. Mandiri Capital Indonesia CEO Eddi Danusaputro sees that e-commerce related regulations will be issued by various agencies, from the Ministry of Trade, Bank Indonesia, the Financial Services Authority (OJK), to the Ministry of Communication and Informatics. The goal is to support the development of digital business

However, it is undeniable, the number of regulations that would be a new challenge for e-commerce business. Eddi also suspect, will be many business actors in this sector who can not afford to continue his business.

In 2017 he sees a lot of (e-commerce) is falling. But in that case, what's left is having a good business with strong capital. In order not to many businessmen who fall, Eddi assess the government needs to establish regulations specific to various types of e-commerce available. In fact, governments should differentiate regulation for e-commerce by regulation for digital technology / fintech business and other digital startup business.

Some of the regulations that Eddi spotlight is related to consumer protection and taxation. Even so, he admitted, there is also a regulation that will facilitate e-commerce business actors, even can encourage the creation of a healthy business climate in that sector.

The emergence of various regulations for e-commerce is also highlighted by Venture Capital Partner Plern Tee Suraphongchai. He suggested that the government invites the digital business, especially e-commerce, to discuss before issuing a policy. The goal is that the policy published by the government on target and beneficial to both parties, both government and business


The government should be open in discussions and dialogue with these business actors," he said. That way, he hopes, not too many e-commerce businesses are falling. Meanwhile, Managing Partner Ideo-source Andi Boediman highlights other challenges in e-commerce business ie capital. According to him, the digital business market in Indonesia is quite promising.

However, the lack of capital will make e-commerce entrepreneurs stuck with the development model in the form of acquisitions by large companies.

As a result, many e-commerce businesses will join under one big company name. This condition creates inequality from the capital side between the acquired and non-acquired companies. In the end, the competition gets heavier. "In the future I see there will be a big funding gap in the middle," said Andi. To that end, he suggested that new or established e-commerce would be established to create products that could address the problems in society appropriately. The goal is to be able to compete in this business. Business actors must also have a specific business focus and sell something that is likely to be a trend in the future.

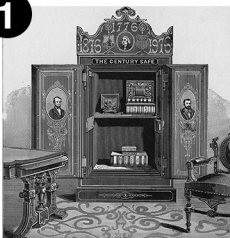

Now, while I wrote 2018 as an example of a time capsule on the previous paragraph, there are obviously some other earlier time capsules. The word “time capsule” was first used in 1937 when a capsule was prepared for burial for the 1939 New York World’s Fair. However, the notion of the time capsule is much older. The Epic of Gilgamesh is considered humanity’s earliest literary work. The book opens with instructions of how to find a box of copper located in the foundation stone of the great walls of Uruk. In the box were the tales of Gilgamesh. Therefore, the idea of leaving a message for the future in the form of a time capsule is more than 5,000 years old. Actually, the first use of time capsule is still highly debated, but current proof shows that the first use of time capsule is around 1876, however, it is very different that the ones we know now, but there are also some time capsules dating from 1777 to 1795 that were found recently, so yeah, like I said, it is still highly debated.

Until now, there are a few memorable time capsules—by memorable, I mean those who contributed so much to the history or one of the earliest time capsules ever. The first one is the ones found back in 2017–November 30th, to be exact. The time capsule took the form of a wooden Jesus Christ statue, with documents containing information about cultural, economic and politics written by Joaquin Minguez back in 1777. The next memorable time capsule was the Detroit century box made in December 31st 1900. It was scheduled to be opened after 100 years, and filled with photographs and letters from 56 prominent residents, describing the life back in 1900 and even giving predictions about the future. It was opened on December 31st 2000. The next memorable time capsule was the very first modern time capsule ever made back in 1965. It was a continuation of the ones made back in 1939 by Westinghouse as a part of their exhibit in New York World's Fair

This time capsule, obviously can affect the future of our dreams. For example, that one time capsule made in 1900? It predicted about the future. Now, I can't tell you if their predictions come true or if it didn't—for it's not even related to the idea of the time capsule itself, I think?. 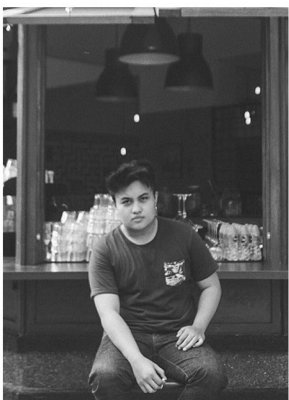
